

SDOU Fall Meeting, Pierre

Some SFBC members attended the Fall meeting of the SDOU in Pierre. Student researchers presented their papers, while Dan Svingen, Federal Grassland biologist entertained and informed us with an interesting presentation. Field trip highlights for most folks included seven gull species highlighted by Sabin's, Little, and Lesser Black-backed gulls.

The SFBC met at the Outdoor Campus in SF. Speaker was Lynn Purdy, bird rehab expert who gave a very interesting talk, helped by a Screech Owl (Olli), and an American Kestrel (Ace).

October Field Trip Results: We got 40 species including a few good finds, including Snowy Egret, and Black-crowned Night Heron, which were extra special since the youngsters were all lined up on a branch with the adults on either side. Unfortunately, they were too far out for a good photo. Also we were treated with White-faces Ibis' (see photo) at Wall Lake south wetlands and at Weisensee Lake. Both wetlands south of Wall Lake had thousands of gulls. Dewey Gevik had a nice number of migrating sparrows, including beautiful Fox Sparrows. The east state park at Lake Vermillion is totally inaccessible due to a large washout, and the highway on the south side of the lake is minus the major bridge, but we saw the season's first Pine Siskins there.

• **Volunteers at State Parks : Current state park volunteer opportunities --Apply online today for a state park volunteer position.**

Protecting, managing and interpreting South Dakota's natural lands and wildlife are no small tasks. Each year, hundreds of people donate their time and talents to do just that as they volunteer within our state park system. On-site volunteers are provided with a campsite during their service in exchange for 24 hours of service per person per week. The majority of volunteer sites are full hook-up (water, sewer and electric). Volunteers provide their own housing and personal items. Service is purely volunteer. These are unpaid positions. Most work takes place on the weekends, but schedules are fairly flexible. Commuter volunteers travel from home and work as needed.

Volunteers are a great part of Good Earth State Park's success.

Bird Seed Note

Word comes from North Dakota that the sunflower crop in ND and northern SD will be very small due to wet fields. At least one processing plant has shut due to lack of seeds. Likely, the prices of black-oil sunflower seeds will rise sharply in the near future.

Birds to search for in October and November

- The Fall goose migration is starting. Watch for skeins of Snow Geese and Greater White-fronted Geese.
- The Juncos have arrived. White millet or finch mix placed on the ground or on a ground platform feeder will draw them. Watch for Pink-sided and Oregon variations.
- Soon the cones on evergreens might bring in Crossbills.
